**TITLE 2. FAIR POLITICAL
PRACTICES COMMISSION**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Fair Political Practices Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in it by Sections 82011, 87303 and 87304 of the Government Code to review proposed conflict of interest codes, will review the proposed/amended conflict of interest codes of the following:

CONFLICT OF INTEREST CODES

AMENDMENT

STATE AGENCY:

California Energy Commission

A written comment period has been established commencing on November 14, 2003, and closing on December 29, 2003. Written comments should be directed to the Fair Political Practices Commission, Attention Kevin S. Moen, 428 J Street, Suite 620, Sacramento, California 95814.

At the end of the 45-day comment period, the proposed conflict of interest code(s) will be submitted to the Commission's Executive Director for his review, unless any interested person or his or her duly authorized requests, no later than 15 days prior to the close of the written comment period, a public hearing before the full Commission. If a public hearing is requested, the proposed code(s) will be submitted to the Commission for review.

The Executive Director or the Commission will review the above-referenced conflict of interest code(s), proposed pursuant to Government Code Section 87300, which designate, pursuant to Government Code Section 87302, employees who must disclose certain investments, interests in real property and income.

The Executive Director or the Commission, upon his or its own motion or at the request of any interested person, will approve, or revise and approve, or return the proposed code(s) to the agency for revision and re-submission within 60 days without further notice.

Any interested person may present statements, arguments or comments, in writing to the Executive Director of the Commission, relative to review of the proposed conflict of interest code(s). Any written

comments must be received no later than December 29, 2003. If a public hearing is to be held, oral comments may be presented to the Commission at the hearing.

COST TO LOCAL AGENCIES

There shall be no reimbursement for any new or increased costs to local government which may result from compliance with these codes because these are not new programs mandated on local agencies by the codes since the requirements described herein were mandated by the Political Reform Act of 1974. Therefore, they are not "costs mandated by the state" as defined in Government Code Section 17514.

**EFFECT ON HOUSING COSTS
AND BUSINESSES**

Compliance with the codes has no potential effect on housing costs or on private persons, businesses or small businesses.

AUTHORITY

Government Code Sections 82011, 87303 and 87304 provide that the Fair Political Practices Commission as the code reviewing body for the above conflict of interest codes shall approve codes as submitted, revise the proposed code and approve it as revised, or return the proposed code for revision and re-submission.

REFERENCE

Government Code Sections 87300 and 87306 provide that agencies shall adopt and promulgate conflict of interest codes pursuant to the Political Reform Act and amend their codes when change is necessitated by changed circumstances.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED REGULATORY ACTION

TITLE 13, CALIFORNIA CODE OF
REGULATIONS, DIVISION 2, CHAPTER 6
AMEND ARTICLE 1, SECTIONS 1150-1152.8

**Explosives Routes and Stopping Places
(CHP-R-02-01)**

The California Highway Patrol (CHP) proposes to amend regulations in Title 13 of the California Code of Regulations (13 CCR) relating to designated routes and required inspections stops for shipments of explosives.

**INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY
STATEMENT OVERVIEW**

Division 14 (commencing with Section 31600) of the California Vehicle Code (VC) imposes routing restrictions and inspection requirements on persons transporting explosives for hire or transporting 1000 or more pounds of explosives not for hire. Section 31616 VC requires the CHP to designate the routes in this state which are to be used for the transportation of explosives. Existing regulations (13 CCR 1150-1152.8) contain these designated routes. Section 31607 VC requires the CHP to designate inspection stops for use by transporters of explosives. Existing regulations (13 CCR 1150-1152.8) contain these designated inspection stops.

The proposed amendments will update designated routes, required inspection stops, the list of safe stopping places and update the list of safe parking places for explosives.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

No public hearing has been scheduled. If any person desires a public hearing, a written request must be received by the CHP, Commercial Vehicle Section no later than 15 days prior to the close of the written comment period.

AVAILABILITY OF INFORMATION

The CHP has available for public review a general statement of reasons for the proposed regulatory action, the information upon which this action is based (the rulemaking file), and the proposed regulation text in strikeout and underline format. Requests to review or receive copies of this information should be directed to the CHP at the foregoing address, by facsimile at (916) 446-4579 or by calling the CHP Commercial Vehicle Section at (916) 445-1865. ADOPTION OF PROPOSED REGULATIONS

After consideration of public comments, the CHP may adopt the proposal substantially as set forth without further notice. If the proposal is modified prior to adoption and the change is not solely grammatical or is nonsubstantive in nature, the full text of the resulting regulation, with the changes clearly indicated, will be made available to the public for at least 15 days prior to the date of adoption.

FISCAL AND ECONOMIC IMPACT

The CHP has made an initial determination that this proposed regulatory action: (1) will have no effect on housing costs; (2) will not impose any new mandate upon local agencies or school districts; (3) involves no nondiscretionary or reimbursable costs or savings to any local agency, school district, or state agency, or

federal funding to the state; (4) will neither create nor eliminate jobs in the State of California nor result in the elimination of existing businesses or create or expand businesses in the State of California; and (5) will not have a significant statewide adverse economic impact directly affecting businesses including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states. The regulated community is encouraged to respond during the comment period of this regulatory process if significant impacts are identified.

COST IMPACTS ON REPRESENTATIVE PRIVATE PERSONS OR BUSINESSES

The California Highway Patrol is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.

EFFECT ON SMALL BUSINESSES

The California Highway Patrol has determined that the proposed regulatory action may affect small businesses. If a business can no longer meet the requirements, they will be deleted from the safe stopping and parking listings for explosives transporters.

ALTERNATIVES

In accordance with Government Code Section 11346.5(a)(13), the California Highway Patrol must determine that no reasonable alternative considered by the California Highway Patrol, or that has otherwise been identified and brought to the attention of the California Highway Patrol, would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, or would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed action. The California Highway Patrol invites interested parties to present statements or arguments with respect to alternatives to the proposed regulations during the written comment period.

AUTHORITY

This regulatory action is being taken pursuant to Sections 31616 VC.

REFERENCE

This action implements, interprets, or makes specific Sections 31601, 31607 and 31616 VC.

TITLE 13. DEPARTMENT OF MOTOR VEHICLES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN

The Department of Motor Vehicles (the department) proposes to amend Chapter 1, Division 1, Article 3.2, Registration of Vessels, Sections 190.32, 190.34,

190.36, and 190.38 of Title 13, California Code of Regulations, concerning Undocumented Vessel Registration Agents.

PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing regarding this proposed regulatory action is not scheduled. However, a public hearing will be held if any interested person or his or her duly authorized representative requests a public hearing to be held relevant to the proposed action by submitting a written request to the contact person identified in this notice no later than 5:00 P.M., fifteen (15) days prior to the close of the written comment period.

DEADLINE FOR WRITTEN COMMENTS

Any interested person or his or her duly authorized representative may submit written comments relevant to the proposed regulations to the contact person identified in this notice. All written comments must be received at the department no later than 5:00 P.M. on December 29, 2003, the final day of the written comment period, in order for them to be considered by the department before it adopts the proposed regulations.

AUTHORITY AND REFERENCE

The department proposes to adopt the proposed action under the authority granted by Vehicle Code sections 1651 and 9858, in order to implement, interpret or make specific Vehicle Code sections 9858, 9858.1, and 9859.

INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

Vehicle Code section 9858 permits the department to assign agents to issue certificates of number for vessels. The department has combined two of its existing forms into the Application for Appointment and Agreement as a Non-Public Undocumented Vessel Registration Agent. The department proposes to amend Title 13, Article 3.2, Sections 190.32, 190.34, 190.36, and 190.38, of the California Code of Regulations to support the changes in the forms.

FISCAL IMPACT STATEMENT

- Cost Or Savings To Any State Agency: None.
- Other Non-Discretionary Cost or Savings to Local Agencies: None.
- Costs or Savings in Federal Funding to the State: None.
- Cost Impact on Representative Private Persons or Businesses: The department is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.
- Effect on Housing Costs: None.

DETERMINATIONS

The department has made the following initial determinations concerning the proposed regulatory action:

- The proposed regulatory action will not have a significant statewide adverse economic impact directly affecting business, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states. The proposal merely accommodates the combining of two existing forms. No studies or data were relied upon in support of this proposal.
- The adoption of this regulation will neither create nor eliminate jobs or businesses in the state of California, will not result in the elimination of existing businesses, and will neither reduce nor expand businesses currently doing business in the state of California.
- The proposed regulatory action will not impose a mandate on local agencies or school districts, or a mandate which requires reimbursement pursuant to part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of the Government Code.
- The proposed regulatory action will not affect small businesses. This regulation combines two existing forms and adds no new requirements.

ALTERNATIVES CONSIDERED

The department must determine that no reasonable alternative considered by the department or that has otherwise been identified and brought to the attention of the department would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, or would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed action.

PROPOSED REGULATORY ACTION

The California Integrated Waste Management Board (CIWMB) proposes to amend existing and draft new regulations to Government Code § 17901–17914.5 to streamline the Recycling Market Development Zone Designation Process.

PUBLIC HEARING

A public hearing to receive comments on the proposed rulemaking will be scheduled for Monday, November 24, 2003. The hearing will be held in the Sierra Hearing Room (Second Floor) at the Joe Serna, Jr. Cal/EPA Building, 1001 I Street, Sacramento, California. The hearing will begin at 9:00 AM. and conclude after the public gives all testimony. The CIWMB requests that persons who make oral comments at the hearing, submit written copies of their testimony at the hearing. The Sierra Hearing Room is wheelchair accessible.

INFORMATIVE DIGEST

The Integrated Waste Management Act (Act), PRC § 40000 et. seq., provides for the protection of public health and safety and the environment through waste prevention, waste diversion, and state waste processing and disposal. PRC § 42010 et. seq., governs the Recycling Market Development Zones (Zones). The Zones are geographically designated areas within the State of California to promote recycling-based manufacturing businesses and to help increase diversion of solid waste from landfills as well as, create recycling-based manufacturing jobs.

POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

The CIWMB has determined that existing regulations Government Code § 17901 et. seq., are cumbersome and unclear. The proposed regulations will streamline and further clarify the Recycling Market Development Zone Designation Process.

PLAIN ENGLISH REQUIREMENTS

CIWMB staff prepared the proposed regulations pursuant to the standard of clarity provided in Government Code Section § 11349 and the plain English requirements of Government Code Section §§ 11342.580 and 1134.2(a)(1). The proposed regulations are considered non-technical and can be easily understood by those who will use them.

AUTHORITY AND REFERENCES

PRC § 40502 provides authority for these proposed regulations. The purpose of the proposed regulations is to implement, interpret and make specific PRC §§ 42010 through 42023.

FEDERAL LAW OR REGULATIONS MANDATE

Federal law or regulations do not contain comparable requirements and as an approved state under Subtitle D, the State of California has the authority to promulgate such regulations.

MANDATE ON LOCAL AGENCIES OR SCHOOL DISTRICTS

CIWMB staff has determined that the proposed regulations will result in no costs or savings to any state agencies, no costs to any school districts that are required to be reimbursed under part 7 (commencing with § 17500) of Division 4 of the Government Code, no other non-discretionary costs or savings on local agencies or school districts, and no costs or savings in federal funding to the state.

CIWMB staff has determined that the proposed regulations do not impose a mandate on local school districts.

EFFECT ON HOUSING COSTS

CIWMB staff made an initial determination that the proposed regulations would not have a significant effect on housing costs.

EFFECT ON BUSINESSES

CIWMB staff made an initial determination that the proposed regulations would not have a significant, statewide adverse economic impact directly affecting businesses, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states.

EFFECT ON SMALL BUSINESSES

CIWMB staff determined that the proposed regulations would not have a significant, statewide adverse economic impact on small businesses. The proposed regulations implement a loan program for the purpose of providing funding for the early closure of older-technology, unlined landfills that pose potential environmental problems. Small businesses meeting specified criteria would be eligible for funding under the program. Costs associated with loan applications are considered minimal.

EFFECT ON CREATION OR ELIMINATION OF JOBS, EXISTING OR NEW BUSINESS IN THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

CIWMB staff has determined that the proposed regulatory action will promote: 1) the creation of jobs within the State of California; 2) the creation of new businesses with California; or 3) the expansion of businesses currently doing business with the state. The

proposed regulatory action will not cause: 1) the elimination of jobs within the State of California; or 2) the elimination of existing businesses within California.

COST IMPACTS ON REPRESENTATIVE PRIVATE PERSONS OR BUSINESSES

CIWMB staff analyzed the economic impact of the proposed action. The economic analysis indicates that one private facility would potentially be subject to the proposed regulations with no significant adverse economic impact

CONSIDERATION OF ALTERNATIVES

The CIWMB must determine that no reasonable alternative considered by the CIWMB, or that has otherwise been identified and brought to the attention of the CIWMB, would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, or would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed action. The CIWMB invites interested persons to present statements or arguments with respect to alternatives to the proposed regulations during the written comment period.

TITLE 14. DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO AMEND THE CONFLICT-OF-INTEREST CODE OF THE DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Department of Conservation (Department), pursuant to the authority vested in it by section 87306 of the Government Code, proposes amendment to its Conflict-of-Interest Code. The purpose of these amendments is to implement the requirements of sections 87300 through 87302, and section 87306 of the Government Code.

The Department proposes to amend its Conflict-of-Interest Code to include employee positions that involve making decisions or participating in making decisions that may foreseeably have a material effect on any financial interest, as set forth in subdivision (a) of section 87302 of the Government Code.

This amendment deletes position titles that are no longer in use and adds positions that involve making or participating in the making of decisions by (1) voting on a matter, (2) obligating or committing the Department, (3) or entering into contractual agreements for the Department. The amendments also would include employee positions that participate in the making of decisions by (1) negotiating on behalf of the Department or (2) advising or making recommendations to the decision-maker by (a) conducting research or (b) preparing reports, analyses or opinions. Further positions added are those making or participating in making decisions concerning monetary grants made by the Department. The amendment also makes other technical changes to reflect the current organizational structure of the Department. Copies of the amended code are available and may be requested from the Contact Person set forth below.

While many positions have been added, the Department has attempted to keep the financial interests required to be disclosed as narrow as possible, to reflect only those which could be affected by the actual work of the specific Division where the employee works.

Any interested person may submit written statements, arguments, or comments relating to the proposed amendments by submitting them in writing no later than December 29, 2003, or at the conclusion of the public hearing, if requested, whichever comes later, to the Contact Person set forth below.

At this time, no public hearing has been scheduled concerning the proposed amendments. If any interested person or the person's representative requests a public hearing, he or she must do so no later than December 12, 2003 by contacting the Contact Person set forth below.

The Department has prepared a written explanation of the reasons for the proposed amendments and has available the information on which the amendments are based. Copies of the proposed amendments, the written explanation of the reasons, and the information on which the amendments are based may be obtained by contacting the Contact Person set forth below.

The Department has determined that the proposed amendments:

1. Impose no mandate on local agencies or school districts.
2. Impose no costs or savings on any state agency.
3. Impose no costs on any local agency or school district that are required to be reimbursed under Part 7 (commencing with Section 17500) of Division 4 of Title 2 of the Government Code.
4. Will not result in any nondiscretionary costs or savings to local agencies.

5. Will not result in any costs or savings in federal funding to the state.
6. Will not have any potential cost impact on private persons, businesses or small businesses.

In making these proposed amendments, the Department must determine that no alternative considered by the agency would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the amendments are proposed or would be as effective and less burdensome to affected persons than the proposed amendments.

**INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY
STATEMENT OVERVIEW**

Pursuant to B&P section 2854 (Vocational Nursing); and B&P Code section 4504 (Psychiatric Technicians), the Board may adopt, amend, or repeal such rules and regulations as may be reasonably necessary to enable it to carry out the provisions of these chapters.

1. Vocational Nursing Regulations

Mandatory Reporting—Amend Sections 2518.6, 2523, 2523.1, 2523.2, 2523.4, 2523.5, and 2523.6; and Adopt Sections 2520.4 and 2520.5.

New legislation set forth in Chapter 640, Statutes of 2003 (SB 358, Figueroa), establishes mandatory reporting requirements for licensed vocational nurses (LVNs) and their employers effective January 1, 2004. This proposal will implement and make specific those requirements.

Consumer Complaint Disclosure Policy—Adopt Section 2524.1.

Protection of the health, safety, and welfare of California consumers is the Board's highest priority. To ensure such protection, the Board is authorized to investigate complaints of unprofessional conduct and unsafe, incompetent practice by LVNs and psychiatric technicians (PTs).

Pursuant to the California Government Code (Public Records Act), the public has a distinct right to access information in the government's possession. However, unconditional access is not authorized. Specific information pertaining to complaints alleging misconduct by licensees and relevant investigations are exempt from disclosure.

The proposed amendments would establish the Board's "*Consumer Complaint Disclosure Policy* (Rev. 02/21/03)" in regulations by reference.

School Program Requirements—Amend Sections 2526, 2529, 2532, 2533 and 2534.

The proposed amendments: (A) clarify the requirements for school programs to maintain alternate students in an enrollment status; (B) clarify the definition of additional faculty; (C) modifies the curriculum hours to permit 12 hour days for clinical experience; (D) replaces the term "non-nurse" with the term additional faculty; and (E) deletes the requirement that prior Board approval is needed to schedule more than 50% of clinical experience during evening hours.

2. Psychiatric Technician Regulations

Mandatory Reporting—Amend Sections 2576.6, 2579.2, 2579.3, 2579.4, 2579.6, 2579.7, and 2579.8; and Adopt Sections 2577.5 and 2577.6.

New legislation set forth in Chapter 640, Statutes of 2003 (SB 358, Figueroa), establishes mandatory reporting requirements for licensed PTs and their employers effective January 1, 2004. This proposal will implement and make specific those requirements.

Consumer Complaint Disclosure Policy—Adopt Section 2579.11.

Protection of the health, safety, and welfare of California consumers is the Board's highest priority. To ensure such protection, the Board is authorized to investigate complaints of unprofessional conduct and unsafe, incompetent practice by LVNs and PTs.

Pursuant to the California Government Code (Public Records Act), the public has a distinct right to access information in the government's possession. However, unconditional access is not authorized. Specific information pertaining to complaints alleging misconduct by licensees and relevant investigations are exempt from disclosure.

The proposed amendments would establish the Board's "*Consumer Complaint Disclosure Policy* (Rev. 02/21/03)" in regulations by reference.

School Program Requirements—Amend Sections 2581, 2584, 2586, 2587, 2588 and 2588.1.

The proposed amendments: (A) clarify the requirements for school programs to maintain alternate students in an enrollment status; (B) clarify the definition of additional faculty and teacher assistants; (C) modify the curriculum hours to permit 12 hour days for clinical experience; (D) replaces the term "other professional instructors" with the term additional faculty; (E) deletes the requirement that prior Board approval is needed to schedule more than 50% of clinical experience during evening hours; and (F) clarify that the preceptor is a psychiatric technician not a licensed vocational nurse.

INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

Section 125.9 of the Business and Professions Code authorizes the issuance of citations and fines. This disciplinary tool is made available to the Osteopathic Medical Board of California through the provision of the Business and Professions Code, Section 2452 as a means of increasing the enforcement effectiveness of the Board in cases of minor infraction of the law. The Board needs to implement this Section by regulations and has not yet done so. The Board is adopting regulations to implement the issuance of Citation and Fine in lieu of filing or prosecuting a formal accusation. These citations will be issued for minor violations of the Medical Practice Act and related California laws if the violation does not involve patient harm or controlled substance abuse.

1. Add Section 1659.30.

“Authority to Issue Citation and Fine”. This proposed regulation would permit the Board, to issue a citation for minor violations of the Medical Practice Act not related to patient harm or controlled substance abuse. A citation will be issued in writing and will describe the nature of acts of the violation.

2. Add Section 1659.31.

This proposed regulation sets forth the schedule of fines to be levied by the Executive Director and shall take into consideration subsection (b)(3) of Section 125.9 and shall describe the nature and facts of the violation and shall be served to the licenses by certified mail. The regulation also notes that the proposed Citation and Fine shall be disclosed to an inquiring member of the public.

3. Add Section 1659.32.

This proposed regulation sets forth the circumstances in which the cited person may request an extension of time to complete the correction. Additionally, this regulation also provides for reasons the citation may result in a disciplinary action.

4. Add Section 1659.33

This proposed regulation sets forth the authority of the Executive Director to issue citations and orders of abatement for practicing with an expired license and for practicing prior to issuance of a medical license.

5. Add Section 1659.34.

This proposed regulation sets forth the procedures for contesting the citation and for requesting a hearing. Additionally, the Executive Director is required to hold an informal conference with the person cited within 30 calendar days of receipt of request.

6. Add Section 1659.35.

“Public Disclosure”. This proposed regulation sets forth the public disclosure requirement and records retention period according to Section 125.9, 803.1 Business and Professions Code. Additionally a dismissed citation shall immediately be purged.

The Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) of the California Environmental Protection Agency is adding *fumonisin B₁* to the list of chemicals known to the State to cause cancer for purposes of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (Proposition 65). The listing of *fumonisin B₁* is effective **November 14, 2003**.

Fumonisin B₁ (CAS No. 116355-83-0) is listed as a chemical known to the State of California to cause cancer. The listing of *fumonisin B₁* is based on a formal identification by the authoritative bodies (i.e., the International Agency for Research on Cancer ["IARC"] and the National Toxicology Program ["NTP"]) that this chemical causes cancer. Regulations governing the listing of chemicals under the "authoritative bodies" mechanism are published in Title 22, California Code of Regulations, Section 12306 (22 CCR 12306).

The reader is directed to the Notice of Intent to List *fumonisin B₁* published in the August 8, 2003, issue of the *California Regulatory Notice Register* (Register 2003, No. 32-Z) for the documentation supporting OEHHA's determination that the criteria for administrative listing have been satisfied for this chemical. The documentation was developed to explain the basis for listing *fumonisin B₁* via the authoritative bodies provision of Proposition 65. OEHHA analyses of dose response data to establish a no significant risk level (NSRL) for *fumonisin B₁* under Proposition 65 have not been conducted. The priority status of the development of such analyses will be announced in a future OEHHA *Proposition 65 Status Report for Safe Harbor Levels*, available at
