**TITLE 2. FAIR POLITICAL PRACTICES COMMISSION**

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Fair Political Practices Commission, pursuant to the authority vested in it by Sections 82011, 87303, and 87304 of the Government Code to review proposed conflict-of-interest codes, will review the proposed/amended conflict-of-interest codes of the following:

A written comment period has been established commencing on November 20, 2015, and closing on January 4, 2016. Written comments should be directed to the Fair Political Practices Commission, Attention Ivy Branaman, 428 J Street, Suite 620, Sacramento, California 95814.

At the end of the 45-day comment period, the proposed conflict-of-interest code(s) will be submitted to the Commission's Executive Director for her review, unless any interested person or his or her duly authorized representative requests, no later than 15 days prior to the close of the written comment period, a public hearing before the full Commission. If a public hearing is requested, the proposed code(s) will be submitted to the Commission for review.

The Executive Director of the Commission will review the above-referenced conflict-of-interest code(s), proposed pursuant to Government Code Section 87300, which designate, pursuant to Government Code Section 87302, employees who must disclose certain investments, interests in real property and income.

The Executive Director of the Commission, upon her or its own motion or at the request of any interested per-

son, will approve, or revise and approve, or return the proposed code(s) to the agency for revision and re-submission within 60 days without further notice.

Any interested person may present statements, arguments or comments, in writing to the Executive Director of the Commission, relative to review of the proposed conflict-of-interest code(s). Any written comments must be received no later than January 4, 2016. If a public hearing is to be held, oral comments may be presented to the Commission at the hearing.

**COST TO LOCAL AGENCIES**

There shall be no reimbursement for any new or increased costs to local government which may result from compliance with these codes because these are not new programs mandated on local agencies by the codes since the requirements described herein were mandated by the Political Reform Act of 1974. Therefore, they are not "costs mandated by the state" as defined in Government Code Section 17514.

**EFFECT ON HOUSING COSTS AND BUSINESSES**

Compliance with the codes has no potential effect on housing costs or on private persons, businesses or small businesses.

**AUTHORITY**

Government Code Sections 82011, 87303 and 87304 provide that the Fair Political Practices Commission as the code-reviewing body for the above conflict-of-interest codes shall approve codes as submitted, revise the proposed code and approve it as revised, or return the proposed code for revision and re-submission.

**REFERENCE**

Government Code Sections 87300 and 87306 provide that agencies shall adopt and promulgate conflict-of-interest codes pursuant to the Political Reform Act and amend their codes when change is necessitated by changed circumstances.

**INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY STATEMENT  
OVERVIEW**

Assembly Bill 484 (Chapter 489, Statutes of 2013) authorized a new statewide testing program, the CAASPP system. Pursuant to Education Code section 60640(q), California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 850 to 868 were revised by the SBE to conform to the regulations to the statutory changes made in the legislation. These amendments to the regulations, which revised definitions, requirements, responsibilities and guidelines for the administration, test security, reporting and apportionment related to the new CAASPP, were adopted by the Office of Administrative Law on August 27, 2014.

Under these newly adopted regulations, the first operational administration of the new online CAASPP assessments in English language arts (ELA) and mathematics took place March 10 through July 31, 2015. These new online assessments are provided by the Smarter Balanced Assessment Consortium (Consortium), a national consortium of which California is a governing member State. Post-test evaluation and feedback reviewed by the CDE revealed a need to further align the CAASPP regulations with changes in Consortium policies as well as the need to add clarity and consistency in terminology and requirements related to the new online assessments in ELA and mathematics. The purpose of the proposed revisions to California Code of Regulations, sections 850 to 864 is make the alignment of CAASPP regulations to Consortium policies comprehensive in order to ensure the security of valid and reliable measures which are used to inform instruction, and for federal and state accountability purposes.

*Anticipated Benefits of the Proposed Regulation*

The specific benefits anticipated by the proposed regulations will be the standard and effective implementation of a new statewide assessment. Administering assessments that align with Consortium policies for accessibility are critical to ensuring valid and reliable measures. Clear and consistent procedures are also critical to ensuring that the statewide assessments are administered using standardized procedures that also support accurate, valid, and reliable measures.

Further, the proposed changes will provide better information about student performance to teachers, parents, and administrators, and will ultimately improve teaching and student learning, thus enhancing the general welfare, promoting fairness and social equity and increasing openness and transparency in government.

*Determination of Inconsistency/Incompatibility with Existing State Regulations*

The CDE reviewed all state regulations relating to the CAASPP and found that none exist that are inconsistent or incompatible with these regulations.

DISCLOSURES REGARDING THE PROPOSED ACTION/ FISCAL IMPACT

Administering assessments that align with curriculum and instruction being provided in classrooms will establish continuity, will provide better information about student performance to teachers, parents, and administrators, and will ultimately improve teaching and student learning.

Adoption of these regulations will not 1) create or eliminate jobs within California; 2) create new businesses or eliminate existing businesses within California; or 3) affect the expansion of businesses currently doing business within California.

The SBE must determine that no reasonable alternative it considered or that has otherwise been identified and brought to the attention of the SBE, would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which the action is proposed, or would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed action, or would be more cost-effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provision of law.

SUBJECT OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING

The Insurance Commissioner is proposing amendments and revisions to California Code of Regulations, Title 10, Chapter 5, Subchapter 3, Article 9, entitled "Workers' Compensation, Dividends (Refunds) to Policyholders."

These proposed additions and modifications are needed to implement, interpret, and make specific the provisions of the California Insurance Code relating to dividends. The proposed modifications to these regulations are necessary because many of the Insurance Code sections in effect when the regulations were enacted have been repealed or changed. Therefore, the regulations should be amended to be consistent with the provisions regulating workers' compensation insurance dividends and penalties for the unlawful payment of such dividends. Additionally, some of the requirements, such as issuing multiple dividend statements, are no longer necessary in an open rating insurance system. Updates to the regulations are also needed to reflect the modern age of electronic transmission of information and to eliminate the onerous process that requires insurers to mail two notices to policyholders.

AUTHORITY AND REFERENCE

The proposed regulations will implement, interpret, and make specific the provisions of Insurance Code sections 790.10, 10191, 11739 and 12921.

Insurance Code sections 790.10, 1727, 10191, 11659, 11739 and 12921, *CalFarm Ins. Co. v. Deukmejian*, 48 Cal.3d 805 (1989), and *20th Century Ins. Co. v. Garamendi*, 8 Cal. 4th 216 (1994) provide authority for this rulemaking.

INFORMATIVE DIGEST

SUMMARY OF EXISTING LAW

Existing law provides for the regulation of workers' compensation dividends by the California Department

of Insurance (Department), including unfair practices and notifications to policyholders.

Currently, insurers are required to attach a dividend notice to participating policies, and are also required to send two dividend statements to policyholders, in addition to the actual dividend check. This creates unnecessary burdens and costs on insurers wishing to issue dividends.

The existing regulations also require insurers to send dividend statements only to policyholders with annual premiums of \$10,000 or more, but give insurers the option to send these statements to policyholders with annual premiums under \$10,000. The Department believes that policyholders with premiums less than \$10,000 are also entitled to notice, so the proposed regulations eliminate the \$10,000 threshold. Finally, the existing regulations contain no provision for modern electronic transmission of documents.

#### EFFECT OF PROPOSED ACTION

The current workers' compensation dividend regulations are outdated because:

- (1) Most of the dividend regulations were enacted in 1976 and do not reflect the 1995 change from the "minimum rate" law to an open rating system. Some of the provisions in the existing regulations are no longer needed in today's open rating system.
- (2) Many of the statutes upon which the regulations are based have been repealed or changed, making some of the regulation provisions obsolete or incorrect.
- (3) The regulations do not provide for electronic transmission of documents.

The proposed amendments to the regulations are needed to provide clarity for stakeholders (e.g., insurers and employers) and to prevent reliance upon incorrect or obsolete guidelines for the payment and receipt of workers' compensation policyholder dividends.

The Department believes that only one dividend statement is necessary. This will reduce costs and simplify the dividend procedure.

The Department believes that policyholders with premiums less than \$10,000 are also entitled to notice, so the proposed regulations eliminate the \$10,000 threshold. This will create more transparency and offer more protection to small businesses. Since small businesses will be given notice of the data and the criteria used to calculate their dividend or determine their ineligibility, they will now have a better opportunity to contest the amount of the dividend or object to their ineligibility.

Additionally, proposed modifications to the regulations will enable insurers to reduce costs by providing electronic options for dividend statements and the payment of dividends. Insurers will be able to send dividend statements and dividend payments electronically, providing an incentive to "go green."

#### POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW

The specific policy underlying the proposed action is articulated in California Code of Regulations, title 10, section 2501, which states that the dividend regulations are:

" . . . necessary in the public interest to protect the rights of injured employees and their dependents, to protect prospective participating workers' compensation policyholders from misrepresentations and unfair practices concerning potential dividends, to prevent certain unfair and coercive practices in the payment of dividends, and to effectuate the purpose of the statutes governing the classification of risks and premium rates and policy and endorsement forms and the approval of such forms for workers' compensation insurance."

#### BENEFITS ANTICIPATED

The anticipated benefits from the proposed amendments include the elimination of a duplicative dividend notice, the protection of small businesses by requiring insurers to provide a dividend statement to all policyholders, and electronic delivery options for dividend statements and payments.

Non-monetary benefits include the prevention of discrimination by requiring insurers to provide all policyholders, including those with premiums under \$10,000, with dividend statements showing the calculation and all essential data used to calculate their dividend. This requirement will also promote fairness, social equity, and transparency for small businesses with premiums under \$10,000 providing them with the same dividend calculation information as larger businesses with premiums above \$10,000.

#### CONSISTENCY OR COMPATIBILITY WITH EXISTING STATE REGULATIONS

The Department has conducted an evaluation of existing law and determined that the proposed regulations are not inconsistent or incompatible with any existing state regulations.

FEDERAL LAW

These regulations are not mandated by federal law. There are no existing federal regulations or statutes comparable to the proposed amendments to the workers' compensation dividend regulations as no federal statutes or regulations govern workers' compensation dividends. The Department evaluated this issue by assessing the statutory scheme of the state's workers' compensation laws in reaching its determination that the proposed amendments are not comparable to federal laws or statutes.

OTHER STATUTORY REQUIREMENTS

The Department evaluated whether there were other statutory matters prescribed by statute applicable to these regulations by reviewing statutes and regulations relating to this issue, and determined that there were none.

MANDATE ON LOCAL AGENCIES OR SCHOOL DISTRICTS

The proposed regulations do not impose any mandate on local agencies or school districts. There are no costs to local agencies or school districts for which Part 7 (commencing with section 17500) of Division 4 of the Government Code would require reimbursement.

COST OR SAVINGS TO STATE AGENCIES, LOCAL AGENCIES OR SCHOOL DISTRICTS, OR IN FEDERAL FUNDING TO THE STATE

The Commissioner has determined that the proposed amendments will not result in any costs or savings to local agencies, school districts, or in federal funding to the state. The Commissioner has also determined that there will be no other non-discretionary costs or savings imposed upon local agencies. The proposed amendments are projected to result in a net savings of up to \$11,210 per year for the State Compensation Insurance Fund (SCIF), a state agency that often pays dividends to its policyholders. The additional cost for SCIF to send a dividend statement to policyholders with premiums under \$10,000 is estimated at \$67,850 per year, but the savings to SCIF by eliminating the duplicative dividend statement is estimated at \$79,060 per year, which will result in a net savings of \$11,210 annually.

HOUSING COSTS

The proposed regulations will have no significant effect on housing costs.

ECONOMIC IMPACT ON BUSINESS AND THE ABILITY OF CALIFORNIA BUSINESSES TO COMPETE

The Department has determined that the amendments to these regulations will not have a significant, state-wide adverse economic impact directly affecting businesses, including the ability of California businesses to compete with businesses in other states.

RESULTS OF THE ECONOMIC IMPACT ASSESSMENT

The Department is required to assess any impact the regulations may have on the creation or elimination of jobs in the State of California, the creation of new businesses, the elimination of existing businesses, the expansion of businesses currently operating in the state and the benefits of the regulation to the health and welfare of California residents, worker safety and the state's environment.

The proposed regulations are projected to have no effect on overall employment within the State of California (Gov. Code § 11346.3, subd. (b)(1)(A)). Given that the regulations eliminate one mailing and require an additional mailing of nearly the same magnitude, the Department assumes that there are no indirect or induced impacts or ripple effects on either jobs or output. Multipliers for induced and indirect effects are usually only applied when the direct benefits or costs are at least a million dollars. The direct impact, estimated to be a savings of \$11,210, is not large enough to affect employment or output at the state level. The proposed regulation will have no measurable impact on the creation or elimination of jobs within California. Most likely, employees who worked on the mailing that will be eliminated will be reassigned to work on the new mailing, practically canceling out any impact of the proposed regulations.

The creation of new businesses or the elimination of existing businesses within California will remain unaffected by these regulations (Gov. Code § 11346.3, subd. (b)(1)(B)). The Department has determined that the proposed regulations will not affect California businesses' ability to expand (Gov. Code § 11346.3, subd. (b)(1)(C)).

The Department has determined that the proposed regulations will be beneficial to California per Government Code section 11346.3, subdivision (b)(1)(F). The proposed regulations protect small businesses by providing them with more information regarding the calculation of their workers' compensation insurance dividend.

The regulations will neither increase nor reduce worker safety. The Department has also concluded that there will be no effect on the state's environment.

**POTENTIAL COST IMPACT ON PRIVATE PERSONS OR ENTITIES/BUSINESSES**

The Department is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.

**FINDING OF NECESSITY**

The Department finds that it is necessary for the health, safety, or welfare of the people of the State that the proposed regulations apply to businesses.

**IMPACT ON SMALL BUSINESS**

The Department has determined the proposed action will not affect small business since the regulations only apply to insurers doing business in California, and pursuant to Government Code section 11342.610, subdivision (b)(2), an insurer by definition is not a small business. Additionally, no indirect impact is anticipated that will adversely affect small businesses. Adoption of the proposed regulations may offer some protection to small businesses by requiring insurers to provide them with a dividend statement and giving them more information and advance notice to possibly contest the amount of their dividend or their ineligibility for a dividend.

**ALTERNATIVES**

The Department must determine that no reasonable alternative considered by the Department or that has otherwise been identified and brought to the attention of the Department would be more effective in carrying out the purpose for which this action is proposed, would be as effective and less burdensome to affected private persons than the proposed action, or would be more cost-effective to affected private persons and equally effective in implementing the statutory policy or other provision of law.

**Training Requirements to Possess Long- and Short-Barrel Rifles and Shotguns Regulations 1005 and 1081**

Notice is hereby given that the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) proposes to amend regulations in Division 2 of Title 11 of the

California Code of Regulations as described below in the Informative Digest. A public hearing is not scheduled. Pursuant to Government Code Section 11346.8, any interested person, or his/her duly authorized representative, may request a public hearing. POST must receive the written request no later than 15 days prior to the close of the public comment period.

**AUTHORITY AND REFERENCE**

This proposal is made pursuant to the authority vested by Penal Code Section 13503 (authority of the Commission on POST) and Penal Code Section 13506 (POST authority to adopt regulations). This proposal is intended to interpret, implement, and make specific Penal Code Section 13503(e), which authorizes POST to develop and implement programs to increase the effectiveness of law enforcement, including programs involving training and education courses.

**INFORMATIVE DIGEST/POLICY STATEMENT OVERVIEW**

Peace officers who possess short- and long-barrel rifles and shotguns in the course and scope of their duties are required to complete POST-certified training courses. These training requirements were enacted by Senate Bill 359 with an effective date of July 1999.

In response to the training mandate, POST assembled a committee to assist in the development of the necessary course. Although legislation only applied to short-barrel rifles and shotguns, it was the recommendation of the committee that the training requirement should also include long-barrel rifles and shotguns. The rationale was that the competencies and safety factors addressed in the training would be the same, regardless of barrel length.

The committee's work led to the development of a two-part training course — Part I for long/short-barrel shotgun training (minimum of 16 hours) and Part II for long/short-barrel rifle training (minimum of 16 hours). In October 1999, the Commission approved the course as an addition to Commission Regulation 1081, subject

to the results of a Notice of Regulatory Action. The training requirement was also approved by the Office of Administrative Law. Notice of the legislative mandate and related Commission action was provided to the field by a POST Bulletin 2015-16.

By approving the committee's recommendation to include long-barrel rifles and shotguns in the training requirement, the Commission enhanced the mandate from the Legislature which only applied to short-barrel firearms. The resulted bifurcated training standards are as follows:

- The training requirement for short-barrel rifles and shotguns is a legislative mandate as delineated in Penal Code section 33220(b) and applies to peace officer members of a police department, sheriff's office, marshal's office, California Highway Patrol, Department of Justice and California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation.
- The training requirement for long-barrel rifles and shotguns is a Commission requirement as delineated in Regulation 1081 and applies to peace officer members of agencies that participate in the POST program.

The specific benefits anticipated by the proposed changes to the regulations would add the long-barrel training requirement to Regulation 1005 Minimum Standards and Training that specifies basic and in-service training for peace officers. The revision to Regulation 1081 Minimum Standards for Legislatively Mandated Courses would provide better descriptions of both courses, eliminate the prerequisite of completion of specified basic courses prior to attending the Rifle Course and provide a reference to the long-barrel training requirement in Regulation 1005. The effect to benefits in regard to public health and safety will more clearly define the training requirements for both long- and short-barrel rifles and shotguns for peace officers. There would be no effect to benefits in regard to worker safety, or the environment, the prevention of discrimination, and the increase in openness and transparency in business and government.

During the process of developing these regulations and amendments, the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training has conducted a search of any similar regulations on this topic and has concluded that these regulations are neither inconsistent nor incompatible with existing State regulations.

**ADOPTION OF PROPOSED REGULATIONS**

Following the public comment period, the Commission may adopt the proposal substantially as set forth without further notice, or the Commission may modify the proposal if such modifications remain sufficiently

related to the text as described in the Informative Digest. If the Commission makes changes to the language before the date of adoption, the text of any modified language, clearly indicated, will be made available at least 15 days before adoption to all persons whose comments were received by POST during the public comment period and to all persons who request notification from POST of the availability of such changes. A request for the modified text should be addressed to the agency official designated in this notice. The Commission will accept written comments on the modified text for 15 days after the date that the revised text is made available.

### ESTIMATE OF ECONOMIC IMPACT

The Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training has found that the proposed amendments will not affect California businesses, including small businesses, because the Commission sets selection and training standards for law enforcement, which does not impact California businesses, including small businesses.

Cost Impacts on Representative Private Persons or Businesses: The Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training is not aware of any cost impacts that a representative private person or business would necessarily incur in reasonable compliance with the proposed action.

Effect on Housing Costs: The Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training has made an initial determination that the proposed regulation would have no effect on housing costs.

### RESULTS OF ECONOMIC IMPACT ASSESSMENT PER GOV. CODE SEC. 11346.3(b)

The adoption of the proposed amendments of regulations will neither create nor eliminate jobs in the State of California, nor result in the elimination of existing businesses or create or expand businesses in the State of California.

The benefits of the proposed amendments of regulations to the health and welfare of California residents will more clearly define the training required for both long- and short-barrel rifles and shotguns. There would be no impact that would affect worker safety or the State's environment.

The Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA) of the California Environmental Protection Agency is removing a chemical from the list of chemicals known to the state to cause cancer, for purposes of the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986 (Proposition 65).

Diaminotoluene (mixed) was originally added to the Proposition 65 list under the authoritative bodies listing mechanism on January 1, 1990. Regulations governing the listing of chemicals under the authoritative bodies mechanism are published in Title 27, California Code of Regulations, Section 25306. OEHHA received a petition from Big Lots Stores, Inc. for reconsideration of listing for diaminotoluene (mixed) on October 21, 2014. While the US Environmental Protection Agency (US EPA) (1988) document that provided the basis for the listing indicates that the hazard ranking of diaminotoluene (mixed) “is applicable to all isomers of diaminotoluene”, and that the evidence on potential carcinogenicity from animal studies is “sufficient”, the US EPA document also indicates that “this evidence is based on the carcinogenic properties of the isomer 2,4-diamino-

toluene: No other information on the mixture or individual isomers is included in the US EPA document. For this reason and in accordance with 27 CCR, Section 25306(j), OEHHA referred the chemical to the Carcinogen Identification Committee (CIC) for a recommendation concerning whether the chemical should continue to be included on the list of chemicals known to the state to cause cancer. At a public meeting on November 4, 2015, the CIC determined that diaminotoluene (mixed) has not been clearly shown, through scientifically valid testing according to generally accepted principles, to cause cancer. Therefore, diaminotoluene (mixed) is delisted effective **November 20, 2015**.

The reader is directed to the Notice to Interested Parties published in the August 28, 2015 issue of the California Regulatory Notice Register (Register 2015, No. 35-Z) for the supporting documentation which the CIC relied upon in making its determination. A complete, updated chemical list denoting these chemicals in strikeout is published elsewhere in this issue of the California Regulatory Notice Register.

This is an emergency regulatory action by the Fish and Game Commission to prohibit recreational take and possession of Dungeness crab and all rock crab from ocean waters, including bays and estuaries, north of the Ventura/Santa Barbara county line. Closure of the fisheries shall remain in effect until the Director of the Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, in consultation with the Director of the California Department of Public Health, determines that domoic acid levels in these crabs no longer pose a significant risk to

public health. The Department of Fish and Wildlife shall maintain a list of closed ocean waters of the state and update that list on Wednesday of each week by 1:00 p.m. It shall be the responsibility of any person prior to taking Dungeness crab or rock crab to call the Department’s hotline or visit the Department’s website to obtain the current status of any ocean water ((831) 649–2883 or [www.wildlife.ca.gov/Fishing/Ocean/Health-Advisories](http://www.wildlife.ca.gov/Fishing/Ocean/Health-Advisories)).

 Los Angeles Region Basin Plan — Incorporation of Statewide OWTS Policy

On June 19, 2012, the State Water Resources Control Board (the “State Water Board”) adopted the “Water Quality Control Policy for Siting, Design, Operation, and Maintenance of Onsite Wastewater Treatment Systems” (the “OWTS Policy”). The OWTS Policy provides criteria for siting, design, operation and maintenance of onsite systems and provides a conditional waiver for onsite systems that comply with the policy. Applicable state-wide, the OWTS Policy designates regional boards with principal responsibility for overseeing its implementation and calls for incorporation of the OWTS Policy requirements into regions’ basin plans within a year of the policy’s effective date. On May 8, 2014, the Los Angeles Regional Water Quality Control Board (“LARWQCB”) adopted Resolution R14–007 to

amend the Water Quality Control Plan for the Los Angeles Region (the “Basin Plan”) to incorporate the OWTS Policy into the Basin Plan. These amendments, which are summarized in section 3939.47 of title 23 in the California Code of Regulations, also revise sections of the Basin Plan to delete redundant or conflicting language pertaining to onsite wastewater systems, and incorporate by reference the provisions of the State Water Board’s OWTS Policy. On October 7, 2014, the State Water Board adopted Resolution No. 2014–0056, which approved the amendment of the Basin Plan in LARWQCB Resolution No. R14–007.
