a. SCDD administrative updates

Update on the probable move to combine both the SCDD Sacramento headquarters office and the Sacramento Regional office within the next year.

b. Self-Determination

DDS has received the waiver back from CMS with 160 items to respond to. Self-Determination (SD) is on hold until the waiver is signed by CMS, however, SCDD staff is available to any organization who would like an informational discussion. Sonya Bingaman made it clear that no one has missed out on any services and/or opportunities for SD at this point. SCDD staff is committed to continue to educate the ACRC community in all catchment areas so that opportunity is given to all consumers receiving services from ACRC to be informed about SD.

c. QA National Core Indicators (NCI), Child Family Survey

SCDD mailed out 5,500 NCI surveys last week to families who have children living at home between the ages of 3 and 18 who receive at least one purchased service from ACRC. They are already being received back at the office, approximately 300 have been completed to date.

Pre-vocational assessments, job discovery and experience efforts, works on social skills, job exploration and volunteer experiences, or Tailored Day Services are all components which can be used for referrals striving towards job development, job placement and on going supports and services for work independence.

Places consumers in paid community employment and offers consultation and support at the level needed by the individual to achieve vocational success. Coaching, consultation and on and off the job support services are available as long as the consumer is employed. Services include:

 - c. Job analysis and consultation with employers
 - d. Job Club – job search information and resume development
 - e. Interview preparation
 - f. Job training (1:1 intensive support to start)

Collectively, In Alliance and Futures Explored, Inc./VTE realize a barrier when it comes to funding. Regional Centers are faced with accessing 'generic' services for consumers; therefore Service Coordinators refer them to the Department of Rehabilitation (DOR). However, the DOR does not fund or provide job preparation for jobs. This leaves the consumer no assessments, training or services regarding job matching, job searching, interview training, job discovery and experience efforts or assistance with promoting social skills. SCDD staff offered to discuss with the Regional Center the need for consumers to receive job preparation services prior to DOR referral to give them the best advantage in finding the job they desire which provides the right fit for their skills.

STATE CAPITOL UPDATE:

**GOVERNOR SIGNS MANAGED CARE ORGANIZATION TAX REFORM AND
DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES FUNDING BILLS**

SACRAMENTO, CA [BY MARTY OMOTO, CDCAN - LAST UPDATED 03/02/2016 8:00 AM] - Governor Brown, as expected, signed the managed care organization tax reform and developmental services funding bills, yesterday. The provisions of both bills go into effect July 1, 2016, except for some provisions that go into effect a month after that.

As previously reported by CDCAN, the California Legislature passed on February 29th, the Brown Administration's managed care organization tax reform bill (SBx2 2) by Senator Ed Hernandez (Democrat – Azsua, 22nd State Senate District) and the developmental services funding (ABx2 1) bill by Assemblymembers Tony Thurmond (Democrat – Richmond, 15th Assembly District) and Rob Bonta (Democrat – Alameda, 19th Assembly District). [CDCAN Note: the "x2" stands for the second extraordinary or special session of the Legislature]. Both measures required 2/3rds vote of the Assembly (54 votes of the 80 members) and the State Senate (27 votes of the 40 members), meaning some Republican support – at least one Republican vote in the State Senate and at least 3 Republicans in the Assembly – were needed, assuming all Democrats supported the bills.

The Brown Administration and legislative Democrats made it clear that passage of the managed care organization tax reform bill, which would draw down over \$1.3 billion in federal matching funds each year for the next three years beginning July 1, 2016, had to happen in order for the second part of the package to happen, which contained the developmental services funding (that also included new funding for intermediate care facilities/developmentally disabled and also distinct part nursing facilities).

Though not mentioned in either the managed care organization tax reform bill or developmental services funding bill, the continued restoration of 7% in services for all persons with disabilities and seniors receiving In-Home Supportive Services, is certain to continue with the passage of the managed care organization tax reform measure. However that restoration, which went into effect July 1, 2015 and was scheduled to end June 30, 2016 unless another source of federal funding could be identified to off-set the State general fund costs, was likely to continue beyond June 30, 2016 in any event, given the strong almost unanimous support from legislative Democrats in both the State Senate and Assembly. The issue will officially be resolved as part of the 2016-2017 State Budget process, with continuation of that restoration all but certain – or as certain as anything can be in a California budget process - according to legislative Democrats in both houses.

In the State Senate, two Senate Republicans, including former Senate Republican Leader Bob Huff, joined the 26 Senate Democrats in supporting SBx2 2, the managed care organization tax reform bill. In the Assembly a much larger group of eleven Republicans, led by Assembly Republican Leader Chad Mayes, supported the managed care organization tax reform bill, joining 50 Democrats (one Democratic member was absent, and one seat that was held by Democrats remains vacant).

Governor Brown on Monday released a statement following passage of the managed care organization tax reform package praising "...Democrats and Republicans came together today to do what's best for California," said Governor Brown. "This legislation will save money and help millions of people with health care and disability services."

Assembly Speaker Toni Atkins (Democrat – San Diego), said in a statement released following the vote on Monday that "the bipartisan agreement reached by the Legislature and the Governor prevents California from losing \$1 billion, helps more Californians access health care, and provides vital funding to address some of the state's other priorities, including dramatically increasing support for the care of Californians with developmental disabilities – a priority for the Assembly since last year. Baseball season hasn't even started yet, but we've already seen a great triple play. I'd like to thank my colleagues in the Assembly and Senate from both parties, as well as the Governor's office, for showing Californians what government can do when we work together."

Senate President Pro Tem Kevin De Leon (Democrat – Los Angeles), said, in a statement released on Monday after the vote that "this bi-partisan and bi-cameral package will provide critical investments to stabilize our healthcare system and keep the promise to care for and support our most vulnerable Californians. This proves again that

Sacramento can get business done for the people that sent us here. I want to thank my colleagues from both sides of the aisle and the Governor's office for their hard work in putting this important tax reform plan together."

CDCAN will provide full report on what the details of the developmental services funding bill and also the Governor's proposals for additional funding that he proposed as part of his 2016-2017 State Budget in January that is on top of what is allocated in the developmental services funding bill.

Californians with developmental disabilities get desperately needed help

It was a tough slog, but at long last the state Legislature did right by California's most vulnerable people. Substantial financial relief is on the way for the system that serves those with developmental disabilities.

The [two-bill package](#) that the Assembly and Senate passed Monday afternoon will provide an additional \$300 million or so in state funding to developmental services for Californians with autism, cerebral palsy and Down syndrome. Gov. Jerry Brown's signature on the bills in a foregone conclusion.

It's about time. California has been falling short of fulfilling the Lanterman Act's promise of services sufficient to allow those with developmental disabilities to live as independently as possible.

The additional funding for regional centers and community agencies — which through the magic of politics got wrapped up with Medi-Cal and something called a managed care organization (MCO) tax — is less than the developmental community has been seeking and, quite frankly, less than those with developmental disabilities and their loved ones and caretakers deserve.

But it's so much better than the stiff-arm the state had given the developmental community for more than a decade that groups like the [Lanterman Coalition](#), the [Association of Regional Center Agencies](#) (ARCA) and the [California Disability Services Association](#) endorsed the deal enthusiastically.

[Assembly Bill X2-1](#), by Assemblyman Tony Thurmond, D-Oakland, provides the funding to increase salaries by 7.5 percent for those who work for regional centers or community service providers. That's a big deal. These places have suffered from high turnover because their pay rates are so low, and that turnover has decreased the quality of services that the developmentally disabled receive.

The bill also provides 5 percent increases in state reimbursements for services such as supported and independent living, respite and transportation. That's a big deal because it gives a financial boost to community agencies and group homes, many of which have folded in recent years due to insufficient state reimbursements for the services they provide.

The situation has been so dire that ARCA issued a February 2015 report called “On the Brink of Collapse.” Now, collapse is forestalled.

But it could have been even better. The Lanterman Coalition had sought an immediate, 10 percent-across-the-board increase in salaries and rates, followed by 5 percent annual hikes until the state established a sustainable reimbursement rate structure.

This editorial board has supported that position over the past year in a series of editorials, but will settle for the Legislature’s passage of these smaller rate increases. For now.

The mechanism for paying for the increase in salaries and rates was Senate Bill X2-2, by Sen. Ed Hernandez, D-West Covina. While Thurmond’s spending bill passed unopposed, Hernandez’s bill to reform the MCO tax was a dicey proposition.

The MCO revision was so complex that some Republicans viewed it as a tax increase and others as a tax cut. It needed one Republican aye vote to pass the Senate, and it got two — Sens. Bob Huff and Anthony Cannella broke from their caucus position. Eleven Assembly Republicans supported it.

For now, the developmental community and its advocates can bask in a hard-fought, much-deserved victory.

Developmentally disabled helped by passage of state funding bills

People with [developmental disabilities](#) scored a victory Monday when California lawmakers passed bills that save Medi-Cal and increase funding for agencies that serve 300,000 residents with cerebral palsy, autism and Down syndrome.

The bipartisan approval of the package means that a managed care organization (MCO) tax will secure \$1.3 billion in Medi-Cal reimbursements from the federal government. Its companion bill, known as ABX2-1 and also passed with a bipartisan vote, will provide a 7.5 percent increase for direct care staff and a 5 percent increase for supported and independent living for people with developmental disabilities.

That means funding for developmental disability services will increase by about \$307 million.

The bills passed with votes of 28-11 in the Senate and 61-16 in the Assembly, with several Republicans joining the Democratic majority in support.

The increase marks the end of several years of struggle by the developmental disabilities community to shore up funding lost even before the recession, said Anne Struthers, president of the [Association of Regional Center Agencies](#). She praised the bipartisan support by the Legislature to pass the bills, which await the signature of Gov. Jerry Brown. The MCO tax bill must also be approved by the Obama administration.

“This is an historic step for over 300,000 Californians with developmental disabilities, their families, and their service providers,” Struthers said.

Advocates, parents and providers [participated in protests](#), letter-writing campaigns and other events through all of last year to urge lawmakers to agree on an across-the-board 10 percent increase to keep up with living standards to help pay for a rising number of adults with developmental disabilities, including transportation costs and operations of day programs, and to keep up with minimum wage increases for staff, among other needs.

In California, the [Lanterman Developmental Disabilities Services Act](#), passed 50 years ago, mandates that people with intellectual disabilities and their families have a right to receive the

services and support they need to live like those without disabilities. Under the act, California formed 21 nonprofit regional centers that coordinate services for people with developmental disabilities. Those regional centers distribute pay to the agencies.

But funding froze before and then again during the recession, placing the system under strain. As a result, group homes closed, work training programs halted and staff at some agencies was reduced.

The increase in those who need services combined with the rate freeze almost toppled California's system to care for those with disabilities, wrote the authors of a UCLA study published in 2011.

Cynthia Sewell, president and CEO of the North Hills based New Horizons, the oldest agency of its kind in the San Fernando Valley, said the 5 percent increases for health care homes, supportive and independent living and other programs will help restore the community to 2006 funding levels. She called it an improvement.

"It has been a long time in coming, and state of California is finally responding to the crushing funding rate freezes and reductions that have plagued the developmental services industry for more than a decade," Sewell said.

Meanwhile, state lawmakers and organizations including the California Hospital Association, and the California Association of Health Plans praised the passage the tiered MCO tax that saves Medi-Cal.

"This is a big deal" state Assembly Majority Floor Leader Chris Holden, D-Pasadena, said in a statement regarding the new MCO tax structure.

The new one replaces one that was set to expire in June. Rather than fund it from the state budget surplus, Brown called on legislators to hold a special session to draw up a different plan that would also help fund programs for those with developmental disabilities.

"Thankfully, with increased funding from this bill, those providing these services have the resources to help a group often neglected," Holden said.



Bipartisan support shows our community's strength!

Yesterday, both the Senate and Assembly passed the two-bill package that will provide over \$400 million a year of extra funds for people with developmental disabilities and the people who serve and care for them. This is not yesterday's news, though. This is tomorrow's hope - hope for a stabilized and renewed system letting nearly 300,000 people with developmental disabilities live and thrive in the community.

These votes mark the end of a five-year fight by the our community. The Association of Regional Center Agencies (ARCA), along with other members of the Lanterman Coalition, worked with stakeholders, the Administration, and the Legislature in crafting a compromise that received bipartisan support.

But the real power behind this was the tireless work of advocates like you. Every rally attended, every letter written, every phone call made, every Action Alert forwarded proved to our elected officials that we care deeply about this!

We have showed our legislators that, together, we have power and rights that demand respect. We #SpokeForJustice and they have #KeptThePromise.

There are still a few things that have to happen.

1. Just like all other bills, these need to be signed by the Governor. He said he will sign them as soon as he gets them.
2. For trivia fans: since these bills were passed in a special session, they go into effect 90 days after the session is adjourned by the Legislature. Thus, if the Legislature adjourned today, March 1st, and the Governor signed them tomorrow too, they would not take effect until May 31st.
3. However, what matters is that the bill putting the money into our system says

this starts July 1, 2016. Intermediate care facility/skilled nursing facility payments will increase on August 1, 2016.

Rest assured, we'll let you know if there are any problems - but we don't expect any! For now, sit down, raise a glass, and congratulate yourself and all of those who advocated for this. We've finally set our system back on track!






